



THEME: It's a Small World for Travellers

People have been travelling short and long distances for millions of years! It's a human instinct to move around, to be curious about what's on the other side of the hill, the mountain, the river... or the ocean. Travelling is perhaps one of our most enriching activities. It enables us to actually see and touch things and places that we have only dreamed or read about. And, most important, it enables us to meet other people—people who are different from us.

There are many reasons why people travel. In The Canterbury Tales the reason is a religious pilgrimage to the shrine of a saint. When young people think of travelling it's usually to a holiday or vacation spot. Others travel to visit splendid cities with their works of art. Some nature lovers travel long distances to experience the magic of a national park, where Nature is queen.

Travelling was not always a choice — for the explorers of long ago, it was a job — a profession. Those men were usually sent by their governments to discover and explore new lands. Today many individuals travel because business and commerce are often done face to face, not only via computer! And still others travel because they are emigrants who leave their native land to seek a better life elsewhere. Among these people are refugees from war zones.
